<b>Accounting Reform</b>	The purpose of the activity is to support the accounting reform in Ukraine: specifically, to assist the government, professional associations, private enterprises, accounting practitioners, and universities to facilitate the transition of the legal and regulatory framework, education and training programs and the practice of accounting and auditing to become fully compliant with international standards and practices. These efforts should further develop the capacity of the private sector in Ukraine to attract investment and accurately measure the performance of enterprises. A subcomponent of the activity dealing with conversion of enterprises to IAS-based accounting impacts the overall productivity of enterprises, which indirectly contributes to trade capacity building. The funding levels reported for FY02 and for the cumulative total are not the full funding of BIZPRO, but the estimated one-quarter that contributes to trade-related capacity building. <b>Commercial Law Center Project</b>	The CLC involvement ensured the Book IV (Intellectual Property) of the Civil Code adopted by the parliament of Ukraine on November 29th, 2001 sets out the framework for intellectual property rights that comports with Ukraine's international commitments and contains text supported by international organizations. Book IV did not receive any critical comments from the President of Ukraine in his veto of the Civil Code dated February 14th, 2002. The CLC contributed to Parliamentary hearings regarding Ukrainian legislation on intellectual property: the issues related to WTO accession on December 19th, 2001. The contribution included preparing a background paper on the history of the Agreement on Trips and its importance for the enforcement of intellectual property rights. Besides, the total of 13 seminars were held on the listed topics for the reporting period, having educated more than 350 lawyers from state agencies and commercial companies, and 120 business-persons in four regions of Ukraine. To facilitate the process, CLDP provides a resident advisor who works directly with the Government of Ukraine on the drafting and submission of materials to the WTO Secretariat in Geneva. In addition, CLDP's program focused on the protection of intellectual property rights, working with the Ukrainian State Department for Intellectual Property (SDIP) to identify deficiencies in Ukrainian legislation and to draft a bill remedying the deficiencies. Demonstrating the effectiveness of rock dusting techniques to control excessive coal dust. Providing rock-dusting equipment to Ukrainian mines, and training managers and miners in the use of rock dusting equipment. Training managers and miners on the importance of using personal protective equipment. Training the national inspection force on proper inspection procedures to be replicated throughout Ukraine.
