<b>Agriculture Policy Studies</b>	The activity creates a synergy amongst agricultural policy makers in South Asia to take more rational and effective decisions pertaining to issues of food security and poverty alleviation. Research studies include creating awareness in government on involvement of private sector in grain management, rationalization of input subsidies, and agriculture diversification. Funded and implemented by USAID/India.	Trade-Related Agriculture	<b>190,000</b>
<b>Alternative Dispute Resolution in India</b>	In partnership with the Indian Chamber of Commerce (ICC) of Calcutta, the Council of State Governments (CSG) and the Patterson School of Diplomacy and International Commerce of the University of Kentucky are designing and implementing a comprehensive alternative dispute resolution program. The program will be made available to ICC's national network of large corporations and small, independent businesses through a five-phased training and outreach program. A CSG team will conduct workshops in India for nearly 600 ICC member organizations and others in the governmental, legal, and commercial communities, to generate interest and gather local input in designing the ADR program. Eight senior professionals and community leaders will receive two weeks of exposure to ADR programs in the United States. Funded and implemented by Department of State. <b>Development of Commodity Futures Market</b>	The activity analyses the present status of the Commodity Futures Market in India and develops a road map for its development. The activity focuses on building effective market regulation and supervision capacity of the present regulators. Funded and implemented by USAID/India. <b>IPR Crime Law Enforcement Training</b>	The Department of Justice Overseas Prosecutorial Development Assistance and Training Office (OPDAT), using US\$100,000 in State Department INL crime funds, and in consultation with Department of Justice Computer Crime and Intellectual Property Rights Section (CCIPS) and Embassy New Delhi, sends a United States Government team of prosecutors and investigators to India to present seminars on combating IPR crime for Indian senior level prosecutors, judges, legislators and other relevant government officials. The United States Government team and Embassy New Delhi, in planning and delivering the seminars have been encouraged to closely coordinate with private industry groups supportive of strong IPR enforcement. <b>Labor Rights in the Global Economy</b>	Activities to promote an understanding of worker rights and outsourcing in a global economy conducted by the Solidarity Center, a U.S. nongovernmental organization. Funded and implemented by USAID/DCHA.	Human Resources & Labor Standards	<b>9,910</b>
<b>Mine Safety and Health</b>	The goals of this project are (1) To protect the lives, safety and welfare of Indian coal miners and to improve safety and health conditions at Indian coal mines (2) To reduce deaths and injuries among Indian coal miners (3) To increase awareness among Indian coal miners, mine owners and managers, unions and inspectors regarding safety standards and accident prevention and (4) To strengthen the capacity of the Indian Directorate General of Mine Safety (DGMS)—through sharing “best practices” and developing a database—to promote mine safety and health and conduct thorough inspections. <b>Partnership for Food Industries Development</b>	This exploratory activity will develop the Mango market for domestic and international trade in the state of Maharashtra. 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<b>Public Private Alliance in Economic Growth Trade Capacity Building</b>	This alliance will strengthen the banking and financial industry in India by focusing on development of banking operations, systems and strategy. In particular, the alliance will help address the problem of delivering the products and services necessary to stimulate the small- and medium-enterprise (SME) sector in India. Funded by USAID/GDA and implemented by USAID/India.	Financial Sector Dev. & Good Governance	<b>350,000</b>
<b>State Fiscal Management Reform (REFORM)</b>	The program works with the Government of India on its highest priority of reducing the size of the ballooning fiscal deficits in Indian states. The program supports selected state governments in their endeavors to improve fiscal management systems, strengthen fiscal discipline and create conditions for: (1) better allocation of resources to the productive sectors of the economy, and (2) enable greater mobilization of tax and non-tax revenues. The program has recently helped the state of Karnataka to go from revenue deficit to revenue surplus state. Funded and implemented by USAID/India.
