Agricultural Best Practices in Chile	To help reduce pollution from agricultural practices in Chile, the United States and Chile will adapt and implement a training program for Chilean farmers and other workers to promote appropriate handling of chemical pesticides and fertilizers, and to promote sustainable agricultural practices. The countries will work jointly to modify existing training programs to fit Chilean agricultural practices and customs. The activity consists of two parts: senior-level policy exchange on best practices and two 3 day workshops on Agricultural Training in the Adequate use of Chemical Pesticides and Fertilizers. The first at the Talagante Agricultural School in the metropolitan region on 7/19-21, and at the Los Angeles Agricultural School on 7/26-28. Best practices policy and practice and related software form the core of the agenda. This activity is in support of the US-Chile FTA. Funded and implemented by Environmental Protection Agency. Chile Environmental Work Plan Implementation	The Chile Environmental Work Plan supports watershed monitoring and ecotourism in protected areas. The project participates in the Global Learning Observations to Benefit the Earth (GLOBE) program, an international Earth science and education program. GLOBE supports scientists, teachers, and students studying Earth science and collecting local watershed and other environmental data. This data is shared with scientists around the world. GLOBE is a partnership among the U.S. Government and the governments of countries throughout the Western Hemisphere, the education communities of these countries, and a variety of private and non-profit organizations that support local GLOBE activities. Environmental Enforcement Workshop	The workshop was specifically included in the environmental cooperation text of the US-Chile Free Trade Agreement, and so directly supported that agreement. It focused on information exchange on recovering damages for natural resources, included a number of US agencies, and had a civil society component. The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) and the Environment and National Resources Division (ENRD) has since helped follow up work by co-hosting a Chilean delegation study tour in Spring 2005. The majority of funding for the overall project came from EPA and State. DOJ only paid for travel for three persons and associated copying and production costs. DOJ was a lead implementer and planner of the workshop. This activity is in support of the US-Chile FTA.
