Labor Arbitration Council - Cambodia	The International Labor Organization (ILO) supports the Cambodian Arbitration Council, a tripartite arrangement between workers, government and employers, whose mandate is to independently and impartially hear the labor disputes. The council also provides training in law and procedures for arbitrators, workers, employers, judges, lawyers, and other stakeholders. The council is widely viewed as the only corruption-free body making judicial decisions and has improved labor-employer relations. Ninety-five percent of the cases are in the garment industry, which represents over 90 percent of the exports of Cambodia. Labor Arbitration Council (LAC) has accepted 300 cases and two-thirds of these disputes have been resolved. The LAC publishes its decisions regularly on its website in English and Khmer.
